Places to stay in the city centre

Top ten must-try places for foodies

Nottingham is a city for food-lovers. There are over 300 places to eat and drink to choose from, so we've selected ten of our favourite places in the city centre. Get your culinary adventure started!

10 BELGO

Where: Weekday Cross

Expect: Giant steaming pots of mussels, washed down with an wide range of Belgium craft beers.

9 BUNK

Where: Stoney Street

Expect: Cocktails and wings – perfect combination, right? Simple but delicious, this joint is a must-try when in Nottingham.

⁸ MOGUL-E-AZAM

Where: Goldsmith Street Expect: Purse-friendly curries, waiters in traditional Indian dress, and a game of spot-the-celebrity in the numerous photos on the wall.

7 UGLY BREAD BAKERY

Where: Market Street and Pelham Street

Expect: There's nothing ugly about this bakery. Tuck into trademark ciabatta toasties and other deli favourites. With amazing student deals, it's fresh, cheap and just minutes away from our City Campus.

6 SHANGHAI SHANGHAI

Where: Goose Gate

Expect: Huge portions of noodles and rice – recognised by both *The Times* and *The Telegraph* as a top spot in the UK to get your fix of Chinese food.

5 ZAAP THAI

Where: Maid Marian Way

Expect: Step into a realistic Thai street, complete with full-sized tuk tuks doubling up as tables, a train, vending machines, and a street kitchen bustling with activity. Well worth a visit for the spectacle alone, and the food is pretty good too.

4 YAMAS MEZE AND Tapas

Where: Thurland Street

Expect: Escape the busy high street nearby and treat yourself to Greek-inspired dishes in this unassuming restaurant. With an extensive menu to choose from, your table will be filled with delicious dishes.

3 OSCAR AND ROSIE'S

Where: Stoney Street

Expect: Feast your eyes on this homegrown pizzeria. Exceptional pizza, fresh toppings, a buzzing atmosphere, and pizza by the metre. Yes, you read that correctly – by the metre!

2 TAMATANGA

Where: The Cornerhouse

Expect: Fun dishes and friendly faces all round. Enjoy Tamatanga's take on great Indian street food.

1 ANNIE'S BURGER Shack

Where: Broadway

Expect: Settle in for a burger extravaganza at Nottingham's favourite eatery. Make the experience your own by choosing from an array of weird and wonderful burgers, and check out the real ales and selection of games in the hidden cellar bar. Consider booking a table in advance though, or you could be in for a wait!



Hidden Nottingham

Every city has secrets, but we reckon ours has more than its fair share. Whether it's hidden bars, or a secret haunt that only the locals know about, there's more to Nottingham than meets the eye. Make like a local and get exploring.

O Hidden history: City of Caves

Exactly what it says on the tin: Nottingham is built on a huge underground network of caves. Over the centuries they've been used as everything from tanneries to air raid shelters.

You'll be armed with a hard hat, a torch and a guide before your journey underground begins. Find the entrance within the Broadmarsh shopping centre.

Hidden bars: Boilermaker and The Hockley Arts Club

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An empty boiler shop full of waiting punters? Not as bizarre as it sounds. Behind the secret door there's an underground bar selling fancy cocktails and pints – you just need to get in there first. The Hockley Arts Club is just as hard to find. Keep your eyes peeled for an alleyway and follow the fairy lights. You'll find Boilermaker and The Hockley Arts Club along Carlton Street in Hockley.





Hidden treasures: Hopkinson Vintage, Antiques and Arts Centre

Hidden in plain sight, Hopkinson is a vintage-lover's paradise. Discover four floors of curiosities and antiquities, housed in an old warehouse opposite Nottingham railway station. Rummage through everything from taxidermy to retro furniture, then relax with tea in a china cup at the Hopkinson café.

Hidden retreat: Bromley House Library

Nottingham's independent library might not look much from the outside, but with sweeping staircases, floor-to-ceiling bookshelves, a beautiful walled townhouse garden, and quiet nooks to relax with a book, it's a haven for literature lovers in the city. Look out for the door hidden amongst the shops on Angel Row.

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Beer, crafts, bread – you name it, there's an independent business providing it right here in our city. For knick-knacks to brighten up your student accommodation through to fancy beers and gifts for relatives, check out these Nottingham indie hotspots.



Discover great music, try: ROUGH TRADE, BROAD STREET

A great independent music store that also offers an intimate live setting for gigs. Browse a wide range of the latest and greatest vinyl, CD and books.

To impress your flatmates, try: DOUGHNOTTS, OLD MARKET SQUARE

If you've got a sweet tooth, then you'll be in heaven with (arguably) the best handmade doughnuts in Nottingham. With a fresh batch of delicous combinations made daily, when they're gone, they're gone.

To get your geek on, try: PAGE 45, MARKET STREET

If you love all things comicthemed, get your fix here. Okay, so the comics and graphic novels sold aren't strictly Nottingham born and bred, but Page 45 is, making it one of Nottingham's best-loved indie retailers.

To sample the taste of Nottingham, try: THE ANGEL MICROBREWERY, STONEY STREET

Nottingham boasts a handful of microbreweries, including the famous Castle Rock and Magpie breweries. The newest addition to the pack is The Angel Microbrewery in Hockley. Pull up a stool, consult the blackboard, and pick your tipple – brewed right there on-site. To set out with no expectations, try: COBDEN CHAMBERS, PELHAM STREET

Cobden Chambers is home to resident designer-makers, pop-up shops, and art events. Head through the gate and down the alleyway off Pelham Street to explore this unique centre of creativity in the city.



Top ten nights out in the city

When night falls, the city's eclectic nightlife comes into its own. You'll find everything here: huge multi-floor nightclubs, alternative clubs, karaoke bars, and places to get your fix of cheesy tunes. The best way to find your way around the city's offering is to get exploring. As a starter, here's our top ten rundown of student favourites.

The Alchemist

For: Special occasions – experience some "molecular mixology" with an array of weird and wonderful cocktails.

For: An urban street party theme, R&B tunes, and a central location near the NTU City Campus.

Bierkeller

For: A unique Bavarian drinking attraction with weekly oompah band shows. Dancing on the benches is even encouraged!

House of Coco Tang

For: A trendy underground cocktail bar serving up impressive cocktails.

3 Stealth / Rescue Rooms

For: Partner clubs to get your fix of drum and bass, indie and house. In a pocket of studentfriendly pubs, bars and clubs opposite NTU's Newton building.

2 Ocean

For: Student-only entry, fancy dress and cheesy tunes. A firm favourite on a Wednesday.

1 Rock City

For: One of the most iconic music venues in Nottingham. Sticky floors, student-friendly prices and memorable club nights.

There's plenty to discover in Nottingham without having to splash the cash. Save your pennies and have a wander around the natural surroundings that the city has to offer.



Impressing the parents

Take a walk around Wollaton Hall and Deer Park, about 20 minutes from the city centre by car, or half an hour by bus. The grounds are a great place to relax and hang out with friends, or to go for a run if you're feeling more energetic.

Fun fact: Wollaton Hall played the part of Wayne Manor in the Batman film *The Dark Knight Rises.*

Entry to the grounds and hall is free.



Relaxed summer evenings

Nottingham's busy waterfront buzzes with life in the summer – perfect for an evening's al fresco dining at the water's edge. Castle Wharf, a few moments' walk from the railway station, is packed with restaurants and bars – including The Canalhouse, one of few places featuring narrowboats inside the bar!

Cost – Free, apart from the price of a pint



One for the boo-kit list

Discover the dark side of Nottingham by joining one of the city's ghost walks. Meet outside the castle walls for a twilight tour, and you'll be treated to ghoulish tales from the city's past.

Afterwards, grab a pint at the nearby Ye Olde Trip to Jerusalem. It claims to be the oldest pub in England, and is set into the sandstone of Castle Rock itself. It can be a bit of squeeze, but it's worth it for the tourist factor.

Cost - £6 for the ghost walk

If you like: Football

Check out: Notts County and Nottingham Forest

Both Meadow Lane (Notts County) and the City Ground (Nottingham Forest) are close to the city centre and boast loyal home crowds. Wrap up warm, grab some mates, and go and cheer for the team.

If you like: Cricket

Check out: Trent Bridge

Trent Bridge is well-recognised as one of the world's best cricket grounds. You'll find it just a short bus ride away from the city centre, in the suburb of West Bridgford. And when the sun shines, the crowds come out in force. Take a picnic and soak up the unique atmosphere.

If you like: Water sports

Check out: The National Water Sports Centre

If you're after a white-knuckle water sport experience, you'll find it here at the National Water Sports Centre. Try waterskiing (think jumps, zip-wires and pumping music) or white-water rafting on the purpose-built rapids. If you're into canoeing, kayaking or other team sports, plenty of rowing clubs line the River Trent, which winds its way around the city.

If you like: Climbing Check out: Nottingham

Climbing Centre and The Depot

Whether you prefer bouldering or climbing with ropes, you'll find two climbing centres to cater to your needs in the city. Both centres have a community feel, with regular competitions and chances to get to know other climbers. You'll also find a ten-metre climbing wall in the Students' Union at the NTU City Campus.

If you like: Ice hockey

Check out: The National Ice Arena

Ice skating champions Torvill and Dean hail from our city, so it's fitting that Nottingham is home of the National Ice Arena. Resident hockey team the Nottingham Panthers take to the ice for regular fixtures. Head along for a fastaction, high-energy day out.

A year in the life

We like any excuse to throw a celebration in Nottingham, so whether it's a summer festival, firework night or Christmas, the city comes out in force.



What: EM-Con Where: Motorpoint Arena

The East Midlands TV & Film Convention comes to Nottingham in April – a chance to meet the stars of cult films and shows like *Doctor Who, Star Wars* and *Harry Potter*.

What: Light Night Where: Across the city

Nottingham's Light Night festival transforms the city and brings it to life after dark through illuminations, spectacles, music, street theatre, and much more.



What: Summer Nights Film Festival Where: Wollaton Park

Bring a blanket and a warm flask, then settle in to watch cult classics under the stars.



What: Goose Fair

Where: Forest Recreation Ground

A Nottingham institution, the famous Goose Fair comes to the city each year, bringing big rides, candyfloss, and a carnival atmosphere.

What: Nottingham Oktoberfest Where: Forest Recreation Ground

When the Goose Fair leaves, Oktoberfest arrives. Take your seat in a 2,000-capacity marquee, listen to the German band play, and get your fix of Bavarian beer and schnitzel.

🛞 Winter

What: Bonfire Night on the Forest Where: Forest Recreation Ground

A free firework extravaganza. Arrive early to pick a good spot and enjoy the show.

What: Winter Wonderland

Where: Old Market Square

When December arrives, Winter Wonderland descends on Old Market Square: Victorian-themed stalls selling trinkets, mulled wine and hot food from around the world. Settle in next to the faux log fire at the bar for a drink, or take to the ice to test your skating skills.

Green spaces and getting outdoors

Over 20% of Nottingham's total land area is made up of open green spaces, which includes over 136 parks and gardens." Here's our pick of the best green spaces in our city and further afield.

Hiking and biking

Sherwood Forest National Nature Reserve (yes, Robin Hood's legendary stomping ground really does exist) attracts walkers and cyclists from across the region. Head to Sherwood Pines Forest Park to escape the crowds, with miles of walking and cycling trails through woodland to explore.

For rural walking, cycling and climbing, head out to the nearby Peak District – catch a train from Nottingham railway station to one of the many rural stations throughout the Peaks.

Relaxing

When the sun shines, head to our favourite spots in and around the city.

Holme Pierrepont Country Park

Located four miles out of the city centre, and home to the National Water Sports Centre. With everything from kayaking and canoeing to an inflatable obstacle course, you and your friends are sure to have a memorable day out.

Wollaton Hall and Deer Park

Just three miles from the city centre, the park is popular in both summer and winter alike – the steep grass banks provide excellent conditions for sledging.

Newstead Abbey

For a spot of history, head to Newstead Abbey. A former priory and the ancestral home of Lord Byron, the abbey is worth the journey to get there there – it'll take about 30 minutes on the bus.

Attenborough Nature Reserve

The Attenborough Nature Reserve is a ten-minute train ride from Nottingham railway station, or an easy cycle along river, if you're feeling adventurous. Take a wander around the lakes, teeming with birdlife, then treat yourself to a drink at the lakeside cafe.

Rufford Abbey

Originally a 12th Century abbey, this country house is a historic gem of the Nottinghamshire countryside. Explore the haunted ruins or take a stroll through the woods in the surrounding country park.



Choosing your new home in an unfamiliar city is no easy task, so we're giving you the low-down on popular student areas in the city and beyond.

City centre

Good for: Being in the middle of it all. With a compact city centre, all of the shops, nightlife and things to do are right on your doorstep.

Choose accommodation:

Byron, Hampden, Gill Street North, Gill Street South, or Sandby.

St Ann's

Where: About ten minutes' walk from our City Campus.

Good for: Being close to the city centre but without the hustle and bustle. St Ann's is home to people from all over the world, the oldest and largest allotments in Britain, and an urban farm.

Choose accommodation: Blenheim.

Lenton

Where: A 25-minute walk, or ten minutes by bus from the city centre.

Good for: Soaking up the student vibe in this popular area, with bars, takeaways, and an indie cinema where you can catch the latest films.

Choose accommodation: Simpsons.

Sherwood

Where: A quick 15-minute bus ride or 40-minute walk from the city centre.

Good for: Exploring the quirky independent shops, bars and restaurants along Mansfield Road.

Choose accommodation: Meridian Court.

New Basford

Where: A 20-minute cycle, 45minute walk, or a short bus or tram journey from the centre.

Good for: Saving your money. As New Basford is slightly out of the city centre, you'll find that accommodation options here are cheaper, and the cost of your travel card is covered in your rent in NTU accommodation.

Choose accommodation: The Maltings.

If you're studying at our Brackenhurst and Clifton campuses, you'll find a range of accommodation on-site. So if you fancy a few extra minutes in bed before lectures, living on campus could be the choice for you.

Getting around

With a compact city centre, a handy tram system and an award-winning bus network, Nottingham is an easy city to navigate. Plus, with much of our student accommodation on campus, on a bus route, or within easy walking distance of the city centre, the bright lights of the city are never too far away.



Travelling around the city centre

By tram



Nottingham's tram network serves the city centre and many of the outlying suburbs and villages. You'll find stops in key locations around the city, including outside NTU's Boots Library, at Nottingham railway station, and at Old Market Square – the hub of the city centre.

By bus



If you're studying at our Brackenhurst and Clifton campuses, regular bus services stop right outside. At Brackenhurst this is the 100 Pathfinder, and at Clifton it is the Go2 Uni 4 service. Both will take you right into the heart of the city.

By taxi



Travelling further afield

By coach

National Express and Megabus both run national coach services from stands on Station Street, offering cheap travel throughout the UK from right beside the railway station.

By rail

Nottingham railway station is a key transport centre for the East Midlands. Regular services are available to major cities, with London, Manchester and Sheffield all within two hours' travel time.



East Midlands Airport is only a short drive – or a bus ride on the Skylink service – from Nottingham city centre. It offers numerous inexpensive short-haul flights to major European destinations.

By road

Nottingham's central location makes travel throughout the UK easy. Approach via the M1 for quick access to the city centre.
